Our theme this year, "Mapping Change," explores the changing face of New Orleans and encourages us to think about how the arts speak to social justice issues. Our programming focuses on artistic approaches to civil rights, incarceration, and life in our city.

We're thrilled to debut a new map on the lives of Plessy and Ferguson, and even more thrilled that someone on the map, civil rights pioneer Leona Tate, will join us for a discussion on her work undoing the Plessy v. Ferguson decision. We're also excited to welcome Dr. DaMaris Hill, whose poetry on the lives of incarcerated women is a perfect complement to the music of the (per)SISTER exhibit. All proceeds from Words & Music go right back into our community, helping OBONO provide resources for adult literacy and host year-round public programming.



Kalamu Ya Salaam



Ernest J. Gaines was born in 1933 on the River Lake plantation in Pointe Coupe Parish, Louisiana, the setting for most of his fiction; he was the fifth generation in his family to be born there. When he was fifteen, Gaines moved to California to join his parents, who had left Louisiana during World War II. There he attended San Francisco State University and later won a writing fellowship to Stanford University. Gaines published his first short story in 1956. He went on to write eight books of fiction, including Catherine Carmier, Of Love and Dust, Bloodline, The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman, A Long Day in November, In My Father's House, and A Gathering of Old Men. A Lesson Before Dying, his most recent novel, won the 1993 National Book Critics Circle Award. He has also been awarded a MacArthur Foundation grant, for writings of "rare historical resonance." Gaines died at his home in Oscar, Louisiana November 5, 2019. He was 86 years old.


